# **Moving Forward**

January and February has been a whirlwind with the pre-contract meeting on Friday 12th January to set the date in stone for the commencement of the refurbishment work. We had two weeks to organise a concert with Julius Nglass and Open Day, plan the final service to be held on Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> and the challenge of emptying the church for the builders to come in on Monday 12<sup>th</sup> February. Thankfully, a great team effort meant that it was all done in time.



The final service in the church was one of Thanksgiving and Blessing to remind us of the Lord's faithfulness in the past, the call to be a pilgrim people, obediently following Christ and to live a life of service. This is succinctly expressed in the lyrics of the beautiful song by Robert Gillard:

We are pilgrims on a journey, fellow trav'llers on the road; we are here to help each other walk the mile and bear the load.

Our Lenten journey, Holy Week and Easter will be different this year, worshipping outside of the church building, but it reinforces that we are a pilgrim people and not reliant on a building. 

# **NEWS FROM THE HIGHVELD**

In her latest mail, Fran has been pleased to say that the number of children in Sunday School is rising which is very encouraging. Following Covid, it has taken some time for people to feel confident in returning to church, though numbers attending services have also improved greatly.

The Soup Kitchen run from the grounds of All Souls is open and the number of people collecting at the gate each lunchtime is increasing. Approximately sixty people were queuing regularly for food, when we were there in November.

The choir has lost several members recently but fortunately an experienced chorister has joined, along with Fr John's wife (who is also a retired priest). Fran says that she is an excellent alto and in her words 'they are like hens' teeth, and she is making a huge difference to the harmony'. I believe this is a universal problem, as I'm sure I've heard that we have the same problem at Caerleon.

Following the visit to the Diocese of the Highveld by Bishop Cherry last November and, whilst there, having viewed the many projects overseen by the Highveld Anglican Board of Social Responsibility, this year the Bishop's Lent Appeal is to support the invaluable and exceedingly necessary work of HABSR. During Lent the Bishop's weekly mail will contain articles which focus on these projects from the viewpoint of those who accompanied her.

During the week beginning 12<sup>th</sup> February the diocese hosted an ordinand from our link diocese. His name is Teboho Molefe and he was in Canterbury with a group of ordinands from across the world and asked if he could follow this with a visit to the Monmouth Diocese. He had a very full week, being taken to various events by Bishop Cherry and other people with connections to the link.

On Friday 16<sup>th,</sup> Julio and I took him to Raven House Trust, where we spent a very interesting morning. Teboho was surprised to see the selection of items which are included in the food boxes distributed from Raven House Trust, quite unlike the basic provisions given out from Food Banks in the Highveld. Thanks to Bruce Johnson for organising this visit.

Following lunch, when we were joined by Rev'd Sue, the afternoon was spent looking at the historic sites in Caerleon and the outside of our beautiful church - and a peek at the inside through the open doors, before visiting All Souls, Brynglas

and meeting the link contacts from the four parishes which have links in their Ministry Area.

It is these personal face to face visits that keep the Link alive and I am only too sorry

that, on this occasion, we were unable to get this delightful man to meet our parishioners. Once the church is completed and the hall is once again available we will be able to offer any further visitors a real Caerleon welcome.

# A STATEMENT FROM FR WILLIAM INGLE-GILLIS

25th February 2024

Dear Friends,

It is with decidedly mixed feelings that I must announce that my time in Beechwood Ministry Area is drawing to a close. After considerable prayer, along with deep



reflection and much conversation, I have decided to accept a post in the Heart of Monmouthshire Ministry Area to work together with Sally.

The Bishop has asked that my final service in the Beechwood Ministry Area should be on Easter Sunday Morning, and that my licensing in Usk be on the 30th of April. This has not been an easy decision for me. Back in December, I proposed to the MAC what I hope will still be a solid way forward for the MA to start moving from the "process" phase into the real meat of the vision and mission phase that's so needed. I had hoped to see that programme through at least to its natural turning point, and indeed suggested this as my ideal way forward to the Bishop.

I hope that in some shape or form, it may yet serve you well. However, it's also true that, throughout the entirety of Sally's ordained life, her ministry has been compromised by having to live where I have served. She and I have worked hard over the years to make that work well. But, as she takes up her own new role, I can't help but think that the right and decent thing now is to allow Sally her own freedom to thrive in her own space — something she's never had before — and I believe that she will do that with her considerable and inimitable style.

As much as I have come to love the people of Beechwood, it now feels right that I should be giving my wife the kind of full support and backing that will let her shine. I didn't quite expect it to happen on such a rapid time frame. But I hope you all will understand why I feel the move is necessary at this stage. I am thankful for the long, hard hours so many people have put into making the Ministry Area and the individual churches work so well, and for the support I've been given.

We don't always say "thank you" often enough or well enough in the church, and I don't want to conclude anything without having given you my thanks fully: for your love, support, and work, I owe you all a debt of gratitude and love.

## ST CADOC'S OPEN AFTERNOON

Saturday 3<sup>rd</sup> February saw our Open Afternoon at St Cadoc's and what a treat we had!

Julius Nglass our Choirmaster, and classically trained tenor, accompanied at the piano by Peter Wileman, professional opera singer and teacher; gave us a veritable cornucopia of music in an hour long programme.



They opened with the solemn beauty of *The Lord's Prayer* by

Malotte, written in 1935, followed by Cesar Franck's *Panis Angelicus* and Mozart's *Ave Verum Corpus*. This set closed with *Ombrai Mai Fu* by Handel.

Ringing the changes Julius then sang *Bless This House, Edelweiss* and *Climb Every Mountain*.



Then the singer turned pianist and showcased his virtuosity with Handel's *The Harmonious Blacksmith*.

Back to the singing, there followed a group of love songs. Caro Mio Ben, from the classical repertoire, led to Mona Lisa by Jay Livingstone and Ray Evans, If I Love You from Carousel by Rodgers and Hammerstein and Because by Guy d'Hardelot, made famous by the great Mario Lanza. Julius dedicated today's performance of this song to his wife, Chioma.

Julius then took his seat at the organ to give us Fela Sowande's Joshua Fit De Battle Of Jericho; after

which he launched into Handel's *The Hallelujah Chorus*, which unrehearsed, and conducted by Peter, turned into a flash mob performance thoroughly enjoyed by everyone!

The concert concluded with *Time To Say Goodbye* by Lucio Quarantotto and Francesco Sartori, as Julius said, reminding us of the beauty both in beginnings and endings.


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# **APRIL**

# REFLECTIONS OF AN OLD GEEZER ABOUT GOD AND HOW WE RELATE TO HIM

# 7. Discipleship

Our daily news is quite scary right now. One of our military generals tells us we are at our 1937 moment relative to World War III. In his campaigning, Trump is threatening to encourage Russia to invade Europe, if he is elected to power. The risk of broader conflict in the Middle East seems to be escalating every day.

After two thousand years, with Christianity as the dominant religion in the world, how is it that the followers of Jesus have so little positive influence? How is it possible that there are some, calling themselves Christian, who see a nuclear war as the welcome Armageddon, because they believe they are saved by their belief in the reality of Jesus' existence, and all those they hate will be destroyed and damned forever, by Jesus' second coming?

What does it really mean to be a follower, a disciple, of Jesus? Does membership of a Christian denomination automatically define me as a disciple? Is it enough to simply believe in Jesus?

A disciple is a learner, someone following and learning from a specific master. Following, in this context is about striving to learn all the master teaches and then putting that learning into practice, by emulating the master's way of life.

Is it possible to succinctly summarise all of Jesus' teaching? Jesus did that for us when responded to the scribe's challenge to declare the greatest commandment: "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second is like it: You shall love your neighbour as yourself. The whole law and the prophets depend on these two commandments." Matt 28:37-40

The last sentence in Jesus' response tells us, in no uncertain terms, that loving God and loving our neighbour is a full and complete summary of everything the Bible teaches us. By linking love of God with love of neighbour, Jesus also makes it clear that it is not possible to love God without loving your neighbour. John understood this:

"We love because he first loved us. If anyone says, "I love God," but hates his brother, he is a liar; for whoever does not love a brother whom he has seen cannot love God whom he has not seen. This is the commandment we have from him: whoever loves God must also love his brother." 1 John 4:20-21

John speaks of loving our brother, someone who is close and known to us. Jesus went a lot further in the parable of the Good Samaritan, when he made it clear that even strangers from a different tribe, qualify as our neighbour. And he stretched that definition of who we should love even further:

"But to you who hear I say, love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you. To the person who strikes you on one cheek, offer the other one as well, and from the person who takes your cloak, do not withhold even your tunic. Give to everyone who asks of you, and from the one who takes what is yours do not demand it back. Do to others as you would have them do to you. For if you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? Even sinners love those who love them. And if you do good to those who do good to you, what credit is that to you? Even sinners do the same. If you lend money to those from whom you expect repayment, what credit [is] that to you? Even sinners lend to sinners, and get back the same amount. But rather, love your enemies and do good to them, and lend expecting nothing back; then your reward will be great and you will be children of the Most High, for he himself is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked. Be merciful, just as [also] your Father is merciful." Luke 6:26-36.

Being a disciple of Jesus is obviously far more demanding than simply believing in Jesus and going to church on Sunday. If we accept that by his life, death and resurrection, Jesus defined love as unconditional self-giving for the good of all affected, he made clear just how demanding it is, when he gave us his definition of a disciple:

"I give you a new commandment: love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another. This is how all will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." John 13:34-35

A disciple of Jesus is defined by the extent to which their unconditional love for another, is recognised by all those around them.





# REFLECTIONS OF AN OLD GEEZER ABOUT GOD AND HOW WE RELATE TO HIM

Imagine what the world would look like today, if over the last 2000 years we had consistently taken Jesus' new commandment on board.

Change happens one person at a time. If I am no more than a mustard seed in the way I live my life, could that perhaps influence others? If it did, using our individual gifts collectively and cohesively together, could we in turn influence yet more others to belong, as the active Body of Christ, to make the world a better place than it is right now?

Love is more than a belief. Love is action. I don't know about you, but I find that very challenging and not a little scary. To be honest, I find the whole Gospel quite scary, but the thought of learning how to become love, so I willingly choose to accept God's gift of oneness with him, is more than a little exciting. I don't think he's looking for perfection. I think he just wants us to try our best. As we become ever more used to it, like everything, I'm sure it will become easier.

Will the new space of our changing church building perhaps become a beacon of love, a place from which we, as the Body of Christ, actively reach out together and become easily recognised by our love for our neighbour, as disciples of Jesus? Will it be a place from which our influence might make just a small contribution towards the whole world becoming more caring, more inclusive, more tolerant, more peaceful, more loving?

It will take active planning, organising and effort to make it happen, and it's not something we can expect Rev'd Sue to do alone. It's up to all of us - and always through Jesus, with him and in him.
