'Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated, so also the fish, as much as they wanted' John Chapt. 6 v11

The story of how Jesus fed the five thousand is perhaps one of the most well-known of all the miracles. Miracles which are possibly among some of the most vivid aspects of Jesus' life and ministry. Restoring sight to the blind, healing the sick, turning water into wine are just some of those recorded. The feeding of the five thousand is recorded in all of the Gospels. Why should everyday 'foodstuffs, bread and wine be the vehicle which Jesus uses to perform a miracle on such a large scale?

'Five barley loaves and two fish...and when they were satisfied he told his disciples 'Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing maybe lost' (John 6, v12). You might have noticed reading this, how Jesus' actions seem to prefigure the Eucharist. In all the Gospels there are the same instructions. In the Eucharist today the Priest must be careful to gather up all the remaining fragments of the bread. Bread that has been blessed by God is especially precious and must not be left lying around.

There are a lot fewer miracles recorded by John than there are by the other Gospel writers. The feeding of the five thousand must have some import to be set out by them all.

In the feeding of the five thousand, as John records it, Jesus is giving his disciples and us a picture of himself not just as a prophet but as something infinitely greater. John wants us to understand that this miracle occurred not just in front of a few bystanders but in front of a huge crowd of peoples. The barley loaves, the food of the poor and the impoverished, are transformed into a heavenly banquet.

The miracles in the Gospels are very often referred to by Jesus as 'his works', but in John they are more like signs or signposts about the nature of Jesus. So for instance in today's Old Testament reading we have a story that prefigures the feeding of the five thousand except it is the prophet Elisha who says 'give it (loaves of barley and fresh ears of grain) to the people and let them eat, for thus says the Lord, they shall eat and have some



left' (2 Kings 4, v43).

'Think not that I came to destroy the law or the prophets; I came not to destroy, but to fulfill (Matthew 5.v17)

And that is exactly what John is getting at. Who is this Jesus? He is not a prophet like Elisha, but something else.

So when the events of the feeding of the five thousand are closely followed by Jesus walking on the sea and the scepticism of the disciples, ('they were terrified' v19)' it is then that John gives us another clue as to his overarching message. He records Jesus as saying 'It is I, do not be afraid' (v20). 'I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry and who ever believes in me will never be thirsty' (John 6, v35)

In an age of scepticism, miracles offer a very particular challenge. If you don't believe in the 'special' nature of Jesus Christ as the Son of God then you will dismiss all talk of miracles as nonsense.

But creation itself –the world created -'*ex nihilo*' (out of nothing.), is not that a miracle? The birth, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ?

We cannot know exactly what happened near or on the Sea of Galilee near Bethsaida. John is not writing as a historian but rather as an interpreter of the signs and wonders that Jesus was capable of. If we see only a prophet we are not seeing Jesus!

T E Jessop onetime Professor of Philosophy and past Vice –President of the Methodist Conference, once wrote

'If the universe is dominated by a spirit, miracles are possible; if by a spirit that is love, probable; and if that spirit has become incarnate this miracle would make further ones very probable indeed'

THE GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia! Alleluia!

Jesus took the loaves and fish and gave thanks, and they had as much as they wanted. **Alleluia!**

Listen to the Gospel of Christ according to St John. Glory to you, O Lord.

Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little."

One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world."

When Jesus realised that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself.

When evening came, his disciples went down to the sea, got into a boat, and started across the sea to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. The sea became rough because a strong wind was blowing. When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the sea and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. But he said to them, "It is I; do not be afraid." Then

they wanted to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the land toward which they were going.

REFURBISHMENT PROGRESS

The stone floor is now being laid, starting with the labyrinth, which is going to look amazing. A labyrinth contains a single walking path to the centre and then back out again. It has many turns but, unlike mazes, does not have dead ends. The purpose of the labyrinth is personal and spiritual transformation. The spiritual journey involves releasing distractions on the way in, receiving spiritual guidance in the centre and returning to your life with a renewed sense of purpose.

The installation of the labyrinth as part of St Cadoc's refurbishment reminds us that we are all pilgrims on a journey of faith, with Christ at the centre of our lives as a worshipping community.
