

Air Source Heat Pumps & Wall Monuments

Jupiter, the underfloor heating experts have been back on site, putting in the compound in the graveyard for the underfloor heating, the air source heat pumps in the plant room, and testing the system. And the stonemasons have been relocating some of the wall memorials in preparation for the construction of the mezzanine.







Grant Application

Kevin Davies, Ruth Kehoe and Rev'd Sue have continued to meet regularly to work on grant applications to help fund the project. A £30,000 grant has been awarded by Newport Council whereby helping us achieve our net zero target, thus meeting the Welsh Government and Church in Wales of 2030 target. A major focus of the project is to reduce heating and lighting costs and strive to be an eco-church.

ST CADOC'S CHURCH BELLRINGERS

The St Cadoc's Church bellringers have recently had their Annual General Meeting and it was decided that we should write an article for the parish magazine on a regular basis to update parishioners of how we serve the community and what we do as a Caerleon band.

We practise every Wednesday from 7.00pm to 8.30pm. This time has recently been changed from 7.30pm to 9.00pm as it is more convenient for ringers coming along who live outside Caerleon.

As the church is being refurbished, we have continued to ring every Sunday morning for Sunday service which is currently taking place in Charles Williams Primary School.

We currently have approximately 10 ringers who regularly attend practice nights and numbers can be slightly lower on a Sunday morning due to ringers living out of the area.

Earlier this year we introduced a bellringing simulator into our tower (See photo), marking a significant enhancement in the training and development of our ringers. This innovative system allows for practice sessions to take place without the bells being heard outside the church.

The setup works by securing the bell clapper to prevent it from striking the bell. Instead, sensors track the bell's movement, and a computer generates the sound accordingly. The simulator offers a range of valuable features. For instance, a ringer can practise alone by ringing a tied ball whilst the computer provides the sound of the other bells. The simulated bells ring in perfect time so the trainee only has to worry about their own mistakes.

The computer also provides graphical images of real ringers for the learner to watch and follow. This technology enables methods practices, which normally require a minimum of six ringers, to be done with just two any time day or night without disturbing our neighbours.

ST CADOC'S CHURCH BELLRINGERS

The cost of the system was covered by the bell ringers' own funds, supplemented by a grant from the Llandaff and Monmouth Diocesan Association of Church Bell Ringers.

GOING FOR THE SILVER AWARD!

Do we remember the Bruce Forsyth catchphrase: "What do points make?

Points make Prizes!

As most of you are aware I am doing the ARocha Eco Survey. When enough of the questions are in the affirmative we will have enough points to apply for an award. So far we have achieved a "Bronze Award", having achieved sufficient points in all five sections.

The five parts of the ARocha questionnaire are:

1: Worship and Teaching; 2: Buildings; 3: Land; 4: Community and Global Engagement; 5: Lifestyle.

We are already up to "silver" in the first three, but still at "bronze "status in the last two. In these last two sections we now need to move from bronze position up to silver status, so then we can apply for the total Silver Award.

I have included some of the questions which should take us into the silver status. Section: "Community and Global Engagement."

1: Can we form a local litter picking group?

Angela West and I are trying to either form our own group or to join in with a local village group. The points for the "yes" answer are 10 points. Please let me know if you're interested.

2: Are we able to "provide or share a local car-share scheme "between us?

Perhaps we could car-share if we live close

to each other. It's worth discussing amongst ourselves I believe. I have taken the liberty of answering "yes" on the survey. (a further 10 points)

3: Has our church "committed to pray for an overseas project"

I have asked Carolyne about this, and I have suggested we could pray for a project close to our link parish in Benoni. As a suburb of Johannesburg, we could pray for their "JCPZ" Conservation Project. Carolyne is looking into this possibility. If accepted we will then include this scheme in our intercessory prayers. Again I have already answered "yes" to this question. (5 points)

4: IS our church" participating in the TearFund: Toilet Twinning scheme".

I have spoken to Rev'd Sue. When the refurbishment is complete, her intention is to twin both of our toilets probably in Africa



(there is plenty of online information on why and how this scheme works, and what our cost would be.) I have already answered in the affirmative. (10 points)

5: Do we financially support an environmental charity.

This will be discussed at the next LCC meeting. If we do, it will add another 10 points.

Section: "Lifestyle "

This section concerns our individual efforts to become more eco-friendly. This will be a gradual process, though we can at least make a start to move our lives in this direction. I have included a short article called "An Audit of our Lifestyle". If you visit the website: "creationcare.org.uk", there is plenty of information on how to do this.

If we can give positive answers to all the above questions, we will have enough points to achieve the Silver Award!

ETHICAL INVESTMENT

Part of our churches effort to become more "eco - friendly " involves saving our money in such a way that we don't do damage to our planet. Most of us by now have heard of the term "ethical investment ": that is: investing that considers ethical (moral) values as well as financial returns. In this case I refer to climate change, biodiversity and anything that damages our planet (though the umbrella term also covers workers rights, arms sales, gambling etc).

The world of investments is, as we all know, extremely complex, so if you've got limited time or investment experience (in which I certainly include myself) you could ask an independent financial adviser (IFA) to choose investments for you, at a cost. But always use an IFA that's part of the "UK Sustainable Investment and Finance Association."



SHOEBOXES FOR CHRISTMAS






SEPTEMBER

Green your home this Autumn. Tackle climate change and reduce your heating bill by testing how draughty or leaky your home is. Find the gaps that let the cold air in and warm air out (think keyholes, letterboxes, gaps around the edges or bottoms of windows and doors, loft hatches. floorboards etc.) and fix these gaps using the correct materials: (there are lots of handy tutorials on how to do this online). Now is also a very good time to prepare for winter by sticking tinfoil or radiator panels between the wall and radiator, as these will help reflect heat back into your room during the colder months.

OCTOBER

Provide food and shelter for wildlife, now and in preparation for next year. Clean all your bird feeders to avoid the spread of disease to winter migrants and put up a nest box well in advance of breeding season. A nest box could also prove a cosy spot for small birds to spend the night on particularly cold winter evenings ahead.

REFLECTIONS OF AN OLD GEEZER ABOUT GOD AND **HOW WE RELATE TO HIM**

10. The Fucharist Source and summit of our faith and our greatest call to mission.

What's the purpose of the Eucharist? Why is it such a big deal? What need does it fulfil in God's grand scheme of things? Is it simply a very sacred form of worship, or does it have a practical purpose for us? Why did God give us such an awesome gift? What are we meant to do with it?

I struggled to find meaningful answers, beyond the most common response of "It's a mystery." However, over time, I did find answers that satisfied my personal need for understanding. As ever, when I seek God's purpose, he draws me closer but the closer I get, the greater the challenge I face as a disciple of Jesus. My understanding of the Eucharist certainly confirms Jesus' warning that he did not come to make life easy for us. Fortunately, there is also a reassuring certainty that I am not on my own.

For the Eucharist to make sense, I had to be clear on what defines a Christian. A disciple is a learner, striving to emulate the life of a Master. A Christian is a disciple of Jesus who is recognised by their love for others. A follower of Jesus would embrace the Good News that the Kingdom of God is at hand, recognising that the God of love makes no demand of us, but rather offers a free choice to live under his reign, or not. For three years, Jesus taught us the meaning of love and how to live it, so that we may become love, to become one with God.

Disciples of Jesus are expected to continue the work he started, by announcing the Good News and teaching all nations how to live under the reign of God, by striving to love one another just as Jesus loves us. This is the whole purpose of Church - which was clearly spelt out by Jesus.

Before he ascended into heaven, Jesus commanded his apostles to meet him at the mountain. Considering he was leaving them physically for the last time, it makes sense that he would want to give them a final directive, summarising exactly what he expected of them. This is his Great Commission to all disciples.

"All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me..."

Jesus claims his full authority as the eternal Christ, one in the Trinity, God himself. This is no longer the fully human Jesus, who the disciples had followed for three years and who was totally dependent upon the power of the Father for all he did. This is the risen Christ, the all-powerful, triune God eternal, who is addressing us. He is not messing about. He expects his commission to be obeyed. It is not just a teaching, it is a divine

command to all his disciples, across the centuries.

"Go..."

We have been sent. We are a Church with a mission. It is not enough to put a big sign up on the door of the church saying all are welcome, please come in. Christians are sent out - with a purpose:

"...and make disciples of all nations."

All Christians are called to be evangelists. We are to share the Good News of the kingdom of God, here and now, a kingdom of mercy, compassion, justice, peace and freedom for all to fulfil their potential and purpose.

"Baptise them, in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit..."

We should welcome all who want to belong, just as Jesus did. It's not up to us to decide who is worthy. Nobody needs to change to meet Jesus, rather we change because we have met Jesus. Why would anyone follow someone they have not met? When newcomers choose to follow Jesus, as his disciple, and live under the reign of God, it is their free choice to commit by being baptised, to belong in the Body of Christ. "...and teach them to observe all that I have commanded you."

Jesus spent three years teaching and then promised his Holy Spirit would continue to guide us for all time. As disciples we are expected to teach and pass on what we continue to learn, always guided by the Holy Spirit. A Sunday homily is not enough. We need ongoing learning and reflection to always improve our performance. More than anything else, our example will have the greatest impact in making disciples - or not. ("Go out and preach the Gospel, only if necessary, using words." - attributed to St Francis of Assisi)

All of Jesus' commands, all his teaching and indeed all of scripture are summarised in the three parts of the Great Commandment, which is the foundation of all teaching for all disciples.

"You shall love the Lord with all your heart, mind and spirit."

Loving God means learning how to become love, so we can become one with God who is love. To love God, we need to know God. How can you love someone you don't know, or perhaps even doubt the existence of? Oneness with God means participating in all he does, and most of all, God loves. As Church we should enable people to encounter God and get to know him personally. We should also be teaching people the true meaning of love, as defined by Jesus - unconditional self-giving for the good of all affected.

"The second is just like it; you shall love your neighbour..."

We cannot hope to love God without loving our neighbour. The Church should enable and support each other to love one another and our neighbour, just as Jesus loves us. This involves becoming vulnerable. It risks being taken advantage of. This is scary and not easy. Fear prevents us from becoming love. Fear prevents us from forgiving seventy times seven and so we hang onto our grudges. Fear is the greatest barrier to love, which ultimately prevents us from becoming one with God.

"as yourself."

We cannot hope to love others if we do not love and respect ourselves. Love of self means meeting our needs, not our wants. Selfishness spoils us, literally. Love of self is much like putting on our oxygen mask first, in an aircraft emergency, which ensures we remain able to help others.

Jesus understands how difficult it is to overcome the barriers of fear and get the balance right between love of self and others. He knows we aren't going to succeed alone and as ever, Jesus goes further in his self-giving love, with his conclusion of our Great Commission.

"And behold, I am with you, even to the end of the age."

In the Eucharist Jesus keeps that promise to us. To overcome fear and learn to love, we need support. Individually we have little chance of success. The forces of darkness can and will pick us off, one by one.

It is for this reason we are Church. Church is not a building. Church is not a gathering of individuals. Church is intended to be a Holy Communion of all of Jesus' disciples united, one with each other, through Jesus, with him and in him - the Body of Christ. A true Holy Communion in Christ is a formidable force for evil to reckon with.

At the Last Supper Jesus took bread and broke it, telling all his disciples (over the centuries) to take and eat his Body, broken as a gift for us to eat. We are what we eat. In accepting this gift, we become the physical Body of Christ.

He told us to do the same in memory of him. As the Body of Christ, he expects us to offer ourselves as a gift to be broken for others, to love one another and our neighbours, just as he loves us. At that moment of consecration, I find the courage to accept this challenge with a silent offering: "Here I am Lord, use me as you will."

When we drink from the cup of forgiveness, we are called not just to be grateful for God's forgiveness, but as the Body of Christ, to forgive and let go of all the grudges we

cling to, that prevent us from becoming love. This is not easy and so I pray silently for help: "Lord, help me to forgive as you forgive."

Why on earth would Christ be physically present in the Eucharist? There must be a reason. Is the Body of Christ intended to be symbolic, or does Christ expect us to go out as his physical Body to make disciples of all nations? Should we just stand at the foot of the cross and thank him for his sacrifice? Realistically, can we claim to be the Body of Christ, his Church, without joining him in the sacrifice of self-giving love for the good of all affected? To become one with God, we need to become love as he is love. A house divided cannot stand. The path to our resurrection is through the cross of self-giving for the good of others.

By his life, death and resurrection, Jesus defined love as unconditional self-giving for the good of all affected. He clearly demonstrated that he has no limit to giving all that he is. In the Eucharist he continues to give all that he is, both spiritually and physically, because he is desperate for us to be one with him in every respect, to become his physical Body, a Holy Communion in him, going out together, to share God's love with all his creation, through unconditional self-giving for the good of all affected.

St Paul tells us we each have an important role to play in the Body of Christ, depending on the gift given to each of us by the Holy Spirit. These are not just nice words or something symbolic. We are literally given these gifts, which we need to discern and continue to develop, to use collectively and cohesively together, as the Body of Christ, to effectively make disciples of all nations, living under the reign of God, here and now.

Christ in us is the Source of our faith. By willingly joining in a Holy Communion, through him, with him and in him, we become the Body of Christ, the Summit of our faith. The Eucharist is our greatest call to mission.

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
