The Pearl of great price

". . . the Kingdom of heaven is like this. A man is looking for fine pearls, and when he finds one that is unusually fine, he goes and sells everything he has, and buys that pearl."

I was listening to a podcast recently called "Sacred". In it the presenter interviews a wide variety of people from Archbishops to writers, from environmentalists to philosophers, from atheists to the devout, from politicians to television personalities. During the interview the presenter tries to find out what the guest holds as sacred, that which has most, or even ultimate, value for them. The presenter interviewed a man called Dr Martin Shaw (not the actor!). He is an author and a mythologist, which, I gather, is basically a storyteller. He likes to tell stories, not for mere entertainment, but which throw light on the deepest human questions about meaning and significance, and purpose, about what it's all about.

Dr Shaw recounted how he had rejected the Christian faith after a childhood of church-going, but became a Christian in later life. He also talked of the consequences this had for him. Many of his friends felt betrayed. Some even said, "I can't be your friend any more"; others said, "You've lost your mind." Martin had become a "God botherer" and the consequences for him, both professionally and personally, were great.

However, as he observed: "I knew there would be porcupine quills aimed at my kidneys. And that was just how it was. Because it is the pearl of great price, and I'm prepared to pay it." For him, his Christian faith is like a fine pearl, and the cost of possessing it is worth the money.

This set me thinking and provoked a number of questions which I'd like to share with you. How do we see our faith? Is it for us a pearl of great price? Or have we become complacent, and perhaps a bit blasé about it all? It's easy to do so. Many of us have gone to church for a long time, perhaps all of our lives. We come to church week in and week out; we say the same familiar words. Are we just going through the motions? Saying the words of the liturgy without really thinking about them, not really thinking about our faith at all.

How I wish you were either one or the other! But because you are lukewarm, neither hot nor cold, I am going to spit you out of my mouth!"

Strong words, to be sure. Perhaps we have lost sight of just how precious a pearl we possess. Perhaps we have become lukewarm. Perhaps we have lost our first love. We are reminded, though, that our faith is like a fine pearl, or to change the image yet again, to use a picture that Jesus himself used, we have treasure in heaven.

From our Christian perspective, it is the Lord Jesus Christ who is the treasure. He is treasure because he loves us and cares for us, and has laid his life down for us on the cross. He is treasure because in him and through him we find forgiveness of our sins. He is treasure because he has the words of eternal life. He is treasure because he offers us meaning and significance and purpose. He is treasure because he gives us hope. Jesus is treasure not because he will make us rich, or make life easy, or take away all our problems, but because through him, and only through him, our deepest spiritual needs are met.

It is certainly true that with such treasure we may remain poor in worldly terms. Not for us great riches and the finest life has to offer, perhaps, and yet he offers something that is more valuable than all of that. I'm grateful to Martin Shaw for reminding me that we have this lovely pearl that is our Christian faith. Perhaps you are too. If we have lost our first love then let us ponder the riches of our faith and recognise afresh what a priceless pearl we possess.

As a footnote, I was also struck by his phrase: ". . . it is the pearl of great price, and I'm prepared to pay it." That set me thinking, too, but perhaps that is for another reflection.

A prayer to finish:

God of glory, the end of our searching, help us to lay aside all that prevents us from seeking your kingdom, and to give all that we have to gain the pearl beyond all price, through our Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen

A READING FROM THE SECOND LETTER OF PAUL TO TIMOTHY

As for you, always be sober, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, carry out your ministry fully. As for me, I am already being poured out as a libation, and the time of my departure has come. I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. From now on there is reserved for me the crown of righteousness,

which the Lord, the righteous judge, will give to me on that day, and not only to me but also to all who have longed for his appearing. Do your best to come to me soon, for Demas, in love with this present world, has deserted me and gone to Thessalonica; Crescens has gone to Galatia, Titus to Dalmatia. Only Luke is with me. Get Mark and bring him with you, for he is useful in my ministry. I have sent Tychicus to Ephesus. When you come, bring the cloak that I left with Carpus at Troas, also the books, and above all the parchments. Alexander the coppersmith did me great harm; the Lord will pay him back for his deeds. You also must beware of him, for he strongly opposed our message. At my first defence no one came to my support, but all deserted me. May it not be counted against them! But the Lord stood by me and gave me strength, so that through me the message might be fully proclaimed and all the Gentiles might hear it. So I was rescued from the lion's mouth.

GOSPEL

Listen to the Gospel of Christ according to St Luke. Glory to you, O Lord

And if anyone is there who shares in peace, your peace will rest on that person; but if not, it will return to you. Remain in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the labourer deserves to be paid. Do not move about from house to house. Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome you, eat what is set before you; cure the sick who are there, and say to them, "The kingdom of God has come near to you.""


Luke 10: 1-9
