








WORDS FROM REVEREND SUE

Foundations in Christ



On 3rd October 2025 Archbishop elect Cherry Vann will rededicate St Cadoc's following the major refurbishment which took several years of planning and 15 months to complete. A key element of the service will include placing a Time Capsule in the centre of the stone labyrinth, capturing this significant moment in the long history of the church.

In the book of Ezra, we read about the

foundation being laid for the second temple. When the builders laid the foundation of the temple of the Lord, the priests in their vestments and with trumpets, and the Levites (the sons of Asaph) with cymbals, took their places to praise the Lord, as prescribed by David king of Israel. With praise and thanksgiving they sang to the Lord: "He is good; His love to Israel endures forever." (Ezra 3:10-11)

This was a major moment for Israel and the first sign of hope in 70 years. Not all were joyous. Many of the older priests, Levites, and family heads who had seen the former temple wept aloud when they saw the foundation of this temple being laid, while many others shouted for joy. (Ezra 3:12)

The prophet Haggai (580BC) reaffirmed the significance of the second temple being built and the promise of God's blessing: "From this day on, from this twenty-fourth day of the ninth month, give careful thought to the day when the foundation of the Lord's temple was laid. Give careful thought: Is there yet any seed left in the barn? Until now, the vine and the fig tree, the pomegranate and the olive tree have not borne fruit. From this day on I will bless you." (Haggai 2:15-19)

Our foundation starts with Christ. In Matthew 16:6, Simon Peter declared, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." The bedrock of our faith is believing that Jesus is the Son of God and our Saviour. St Paul wrote, "By the grace God has given me, I laid a foundation as an expert builder, and someone else is building on it. But each one should be careful how he builds. For no one can lay any foundation other than the one already laid, which is Jesus Christ." 1 Corinthians 3:10-11

Jesus is our starting point when it comes to faith. St Paul in the letter to the Ephesians

4:22-24 reminds us 'to put off your old self, which is being corrupted by its deceitful desires; to be made new in the attitude of your minds; and to put on the new self, created to be like God in true righteousness and holiness'.

What is faith? Hebrews 11:1-3 answers that question: 'Now faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see'. These are considered to be the foundational doctrines we need to understand as we enter into our new life in Jesus Christ. Being a member of Christ's Church is more than attending a meeting or going to a building. It is a relational way of life together as we pursue His mission on the earth. J. I. Packer (English-Canadian theologian, 1926–2020) said it well when he summed up the church's mission: "The task of the church is to make the invisible kingdom visible as we live God's values and presence among us in front of a watching world."

Christ is building His Church at St Cadoc's. As a part of the body of Christ, we are to build in cooperation and under the headship of Christ, with the strength of Christ, and for the glory of Christ.

Church history shows us how Christ has been faithfully building His Church. Irenaeus, in his apologetic *Against Heresies*, fought against serious threats to the church from false teachers. This brought the needed theological arguments against damning false teaching. The Gutenberg Bible (mid-15th century) marked the beginning of a revolution in human communications every bit as influential as the birth of the World Wide Web. Through those efforts, Christ was building His Church. Coming out of the Dark Ages, Reformation truths were recovered. In and through faithful men and women, Christ was building His Church.

In Ephesians 2, St Paul writes how the Church is "built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus himself being the cornerstone." The first apostles laid the foundation, and we are called to build on that foundation. The early church continually devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching.

In observing church history, there are many times it appeared defeated—locked up, bound in by gates of persecution, false teaching, and death. But Christ continues to build. As martyrs spilled their blood, it became the seed for the gospel to spread and flourish even more. Henry Martyn (Anglican Priest, Missionary and theologian 1781-1812) wrote, "You cannot harm me, you can only kill me."

The refurbishment of St Cadoc's is a pivotal moment in the life of the church. It offers an opportunity to explore new forms of worship and mission. It serves as a reminder that God is faithful to His word. He who began a good work in us will carry it to completion.



Creator God, your name is written on every leaf, every bird, every river, every stone and every living being.


We praise and worship you for the magnificence of your creation.

Churches Together locally are organising the annual Shoe Box Appeal, on behalf of Blythswood Care. Please see here for instructions as to how you can help this worthy cause.

If you would like to take part, please collect a leaflet, either from the back of the church, or contact me on 01633 422051, and I'll make sure you have one. Last year our parishioners were extremely generous, and the need has not diminished.

I would add one caveat; please don't send in your box without an official checklist form, which is part of the leaflet. Several of you sent in boxes with home - made lists attached to the front, and our local organiser Myra Ashcroft, had to open all of them, check the contents and fill in the correct form. This was really time consuming.



REFLECTIONS OF AN OLD GEEZER ABOUT GOD AND HOW WE RELATE TO HIM

13. The Purpose of Church

For someone outside of the Church, (i.e. the universal Christian Church, including all denominations), and listening to or reading the news media, it is easy to wonder why anyone would want to join such an institution. So many Church leaders and people of influence continue to undermine the moral authority of the Church. Will the stories of abuse ever end? Will abuse of the vulnerable ever stop?

When will the Church learn that a policy of "least said, soonest mended" is the very thing that brings the Church into disrepute? It gives licence to the wicked to continue. In the face of collective silence, those who are disgusted lose hope and leave, while those who might consider joining are easily dissuaded from doing so by friends and family who have a ready list of reasons from everyday news to be concerned.

What has happened? Are people no longer interested in a God of love, or do they doubt that such a God is real? Realistically, few people differentiate between God and the Church. When they hear bad news about the Church, they ask what kind of God allows that? How can such a God possibly be love?

As a result, it should come as no surprise that the Church is dying in the relatively affluent, educated and social media-saturated West, where people are free to question and choose for themselves, or be influenced by ill-informed prejudice.

Those of us who remain in the Church know that there is much more to Church than the bad behaviour of some leaders and people of influence who let us down. But knowing and cherishing the goodness of God and enjoying his blessings does not absolve us of the responsibility of being disciples of Jesus.

We need to be the Church that Christ calls us to be. We should step back from all the confusion and take stock. We need to acknowledge that in so many ways the Church has lost the plot. If we want growth, we need to take a good hard look at ourselves and question whether we truly understand the purpose of Christ's Church. If we aren't willing to do this, we should resign ourselves to managing our continued decline and get ready to hand our beautiful, newly renovated church over to become no more than a community space, the new town hall.

Doing more of the same and expecting a different result is delusional. It truly is the definition of insanity.

When I look around our Church, I see so many people in the autumn of life, like me. We've done our bit, and it would be good to relax and enjoy what blessings we have left. However, a good friend recently pointed out to me that autumn is the time of harvest. God needs help with that harvest, and he has a purpose for those of us with time on our hands.

So, what is Christ's purpose for his Church? Is it to go to Church on Sunday and try to be good people, or is it perhaps more than that?

Jesus was very specific about what he expects of his Church. Before he ascended into heaven, Jesus ordered the twelve to meet him at the mountain chosen for his ascension. He ordered them to be there, knowing that some still doubted and might not have come. He obviously had something important to say. They were the foundation of his Church, and he wanted to make sure there was no doubt that he expected them to continue the work he started, to bring about peace and joy for the whole world, by choosing to live under the reign of God's love, here and now.

We should bear in mind that this was not Jesus, who had surrendered to the limitations of being human, giving this commission. This was the risen Christ Eternal, one in the Holy Trinity. This was a command directly from God. In his opening words Jesus confirms this.

'The eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had ordered them. When they saw him, they worshiped, but they doubted. Then Jesus approached and said to them, "All power in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age." Matt: 28:16-20

"All power in heaven and earth has been given to me..." Jesus confirms he is speaking as Christ Eternal. Only God has all power in heaven and earth. This is a command from God. "Go, therefore..."

Because he has invoked his full authority as our God, this is a command that Jesus clearly expects all his disciples throughout the generations to obey. This is God's *Great Commission* to his Church. We are a missionary Church. It is not enough to put a sign up saying all are welcome. We are sent out. *"and make disciples of all nations..."*The purpose of Church is to make disciples. A disciple is a learner following a Master. We are disciples of Jesus. The measure of our discipleship is not a belief in exclusive religious institutional teaching, but our behaviour as followers of Jesus. *"It is by your love for one another, that you will be recognised as my disciples."*

"baptising them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the holy Spirit..."

Baptism is about being welcomed to belong in God's family, his Church, with all the rights and responsibilities that go with that.

"teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you..."

Jesus gave us several commandments. His first commandment was to link love of God with love of neighbour in the *Great Commandment*.

"You shall love the Lord your God..."

Loving God certainly involves prayer, praise and worship but to truly love God we need to align our life and action with what God does – he loves all his creation, which is why Jesus linked loving our neighbour and ourselves with loving God. He also made it clear that this was the sole purpose of the whole law and all the teachings of the prophets.

"You shall love your neighbour, as yourself."

From the parable of the Good Samaritan, Jesus gave us a very broad definition of who our neighbour is and that love means far more than lip service and obeying doctrine and dogma. We also need to love ourselves, which should not be confused with narcissistic self-love, but rather self-respect and making sure that our needs (not our wants) are met, so we are able to help meet the needs of others.

"And behold, I am with you always, even to the end of the age..."

This relates to Jesus' command at the Last Supper for us to "do this in memory of me." The Eucharist is the source and summit of our faith, a gift Jesus gave us to become the Body of Christ, his Church, to go out together, through him, with him and in him, to bring God's love to all the world. This is how we love God best. We cannot love God, without loving our neighbour.

From the earliest time there have been key Church practices that relate directly to fulfilling the purpose of Church that Jesus gave us, before he ascended into heaven. If we fail in any one of them, we will not be successful in carrying out his command to make disciples of all nations and rather than growing, we will continue to die as a Church.

The original ancient key practices of Church in Greek are:

Leiturgia – Embracing and loving God in prayer, praise, worship and oneness in a Holy Communion in the Eucharist.

Koinonia – Welcoming all to belong and build up God's family, our Church community. **Didache** – Teaching and encouraging Jesus' disciples to love one another as he loves us and obey all he commanded us.

Diakonia – Going out together as the Body of Christ to minister to the needs of those around us and share God's love throughout our wider community.

Kerygma – Sharing the Good News that the kingdom of God is at hand and all are 20

welcome to live under his reign of love, as disciples of Jesus.

When we look at the gap between where Christ calls us to be, and where the Christian Church is in our affluent West, it is very easy to become disheartened.

I have a wonderful book called "I am with you" by John Wooley. I call it my telephone to God because when I am feeling down (and I remember!) I say a little prayer for guidance and then randomly open the book. The message I get is always highly pertinent to the issue I am facing. And often, when I doubt and I'm locked in my own negative thoughts, a quiet message pops into my head: "Open the book."

I felt quite disheartened after writing this reflection and was full of doubt. "Really Lord? Is this what you want? Let's get real here, it's not going to make any difference. I'm just going to upset people." Immediately the message popped into my head: "Open the book" and this is what I received:

"I have to teach My followers submission to My will when it is not easy. I have to see their willingness to follow a hard road, and to make sacrifices for My sake.

When I see the submissive heart, I can show the more joyous side of My will - the restful communion with Me, the enjoyment of Myself, My gifts and My world - which I want them to have, because I love them so very much! My influence then cannot help working, and My plans going forward.

To reveal, at the outset, the many rewards of life with Me would produce the wrong motive for acceptance of My will. Only when I see unquestioning obedience, can I then shower My love and peace - and reveal the enjoyment of them as being just as truly My will, as are sacrifice and duty.

If only My people had a heart which would reverence and obey Me. (Deuteronomy 5.29)"

Once again, I was reminded of Jesus' promise: "and behold I am with you always, even to the end of the age."

Through Jesus, with him and in him, all things are possible.

Over the course of future reflections, I will explore in greater depth how these key practices of Church translate into the world we live in today.
